### <u>Listening for Overall Message</u>

Listen to the talk one time.

Discussion Question: What were some key takeaways? What did you learn?

#### Listening for Detail

Take two minutes to read through the questions in depth.

Then watch the TED Talk and answer the questions.

After watching, allow one minute to finish writing any answers and prepare for details you will need to listen for the second time. Look at the inference questions before watching for the second time also.

What did the speaker do when she was 27 years old?	

### Inference Questions

Before watching for the second time take one minute to read through the inference questions. You only need to think about these when you watch.

Watch the talk a second time, completing your questions from the previous section and beginning to think about the answers to these.

There will be time after to complete these inference questions.

(1) What do you think are two key messages the reader wants you to take away from the talk?
(2) a) In your own words, describe what grit is?
b) Why do you think grit might be an important magazine of augus 2
b) Why do you think grit might be an important measure of success?

(3) What do you think the speaker will be focusing on in her career in the months and years following this TED talk? Why?
(4) What do you think the speaker means in her final sentence when she says, "We need to be gritty about getting our kids grittier"?
Post-Listening Discussion Questions  What are your own takeaways from this talk? What have you learnt?  How might you use what you have learnt from this talk in the future?
